

#### **ANALYSIS OF PERFORMANCE BY SIMUNYE CO-OP**

- Late Payments and returning of claims put constrain on cash flow
- Co-op experience financial constrains and poor cash flow
- Late signing of service level agreement reduced planning and preparation time
- •Poor condition of tractors and implements received from previous service provider contributes that targets wont be reached
- •Due to poor cash flow breakdowns are not repaired in time
- Received diesel to end of planting season
- Capacity of the cooperative to implement Masibuyele Emasimini are very limited
- •Not understand the roles and responsibilities as service provider works negatively on the performance of the co-op
- Reporting and recordkeeping are a challenge
- Scheduling, allocation and utilizing of tractors and implements not optimal
- •Knowledge, capacity and finance to repair breakdowns hamper performance
- Poor relationships with some officials and farmers had a effect on performance





#### RECOMMENDATIONS TO IMPROVE CO-OP PERFORMANCE


- Cooperatives in need of financial kick-start by Department
- Planning for coming season to start in time
- •All inputs including diesel to be delivered before planting season commence
- •Department to assist to arrange with tractor dealers to repair tractors and implements before the planting season starts
- Claiming process to be made easier
- Continues Capacity building training to be arranged for cooperatives
- •The Maibuyele Emasimini approved policy with the cooperatives roles and responsibilities to be workshop
- •A master operational and implementation plan to be finalised in time
- Approval to be given by department for the appointment of a qualified mechanic
- •Managers to assist to improve working relationships between cooperative, officials and farmers
